NCEA Results 2023

Results for our senior students have compared favourably with National results and show that the blend of academic and vocational pathways presented to our students is the right way forward.

Our results across all three levels are 20-30% higher.

Level 1: 81.8% pass rate

Level 2: 93.7% pass rate

Level 3: 100% pass rate

Many of our students do well with the option to take part in NMIT courses and online learning which caters for learning styles and interests. Many of our students have continued with their studies or have left school to pursue Vocational courses, sending them along pathways which will bring them success.

Our only concern moving forward, is the low percentage of students achieving endorsement levels in their subjects which allow this. One of our main goals for 2024 is to encourage this extra effort from students to hand in higher quality work.

With effort and self-management, we hope to achieve even higher levels of success next year.

2024 House Athletics

This year the House competition for Athletics was contested with tough competition and well supported participation. Each house had their moments of glory on the day with members of both Tadmor and Motupiko breaking School records.

A record from 1991 was broken in the 400m by Claude Gaddes in the Under 12 age group with a time of 1.10.56 whilst Bronco MacDonald set a new record in the Under 14 age group with a time of 1.01.50 during the Heats in the morning. Breeze Streeter-Mantell had a great day on the track breaking both the 100m and 200m Under 14 records. In the 200m she ran a time of 27.50secs and 13.15secs in the 100m. Sarah Jones improved on her own Under 19 records in the field events. She improved the Javelin record to 28.22m and the Shot Putt to 9.90m.

The standard was high this year and Tapawera will be sending 9 athletes to the Regional Competition on the 11th March at Saxton including a Girls' Under 14 4x100m relay team for the first time.

At the end of proceedings Motupiko who had also done well in the 3000m, 1500m and Triple Jump prior to this event won both Relays to finish just ahead of Tadmor on 301 points compared to 291. They also participated well finishing first ahead of Tadmor with 248 points compared to 235. This continues the standard set by Motupiko in earlier House competitions.

Please look out for overdue books at home, there's a lot out there.







Recycling and Sustainability at Libelle

You will have noticed lately that the containers that most of your lunches come in have changed. The new trays are recyclable, and we are delighted to be seeing positive progress from this new initiative.

Above is an image of roughly 90,000 compacted Lunch by Libelle containers. This initiative has not been without its challenges, as some containers are still unsalvageable, due to food contamination, and these end up in landfill. However, any eligible trays are compressed into bales like the one above, with several tonnes already sent for smelting. They are then transformed into parts for vehicle manufacturing. We hope this ongoing process can get better and better, and we appreciate the support of students and schools.

Landfill Reductions In our Central Kitchen we've transitioned to sourcing all our fresh vegetables from a reputable farm situated in the Manawatu region. This move is a conscious effort to minimize our contribution to the global CO2 issue. The produce is then swiftly transported to their nearby processing plant, just a stone's throw away from our kitchen site. The vegetables are then transported to our site in bulk bins. These bins undergo a thorough sanitization process and are repeatedly reused, contributing to our sustainability endeavours. We've also transitioned using recyclable crates for delivering our Central Kitchen meals to regional kitchens. This change eliminates the need for the cardboard cartons we previously relied on.

Sandwich Wedges – Not only are the new sandwich wedges keeping the sandwiches fresh and appealing the wedges are fully recyclable. Pop them back in the delivery box for Libelle to take them to responsible recyclers
