




New Drop-Off Zone





Yr 7 & 8 Food Technology Term 1

Whānau Information: Phones Away for the Day

International research indicates some key challenges with cell phones at school such as being a major distraction for our students. The current government is leading an initiative and has designed rules to ensure that the learning of all students is maximised, while minimising any potential for distraction and cyber-bullying. Our approach is phones "away for the day", meaning cell phones either do not come with the student to school (Year 0-10) or are switched off and locked in lockers or bags during the full school day (Year 11-13). This includes break times as well.

For **Year 0-10 students**, cell phones must be kept at home. If students require their cell phones for genuine reasons eg: it is needed for health reasons (for example, to monitor insulin levels) or to help a student with a disability or learning support need (for example, to assist with impaired communication). These arrangements need to be made before the cell phone is at school. Parents / Caregivers will need to email the principal (principal@tapawera.school.nz) stating the reason the phone is needed. An exemption will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Year 11-13 students are asked to regulate their cell phones by keeping phones off and away all day.

It is important to note that if students do decide to bring a cell phone to the school grounds, they do so at their own risk. The school is not responsible for any loss or damage caused to any cellphone. If students require their cell phones to be used throughout the day for genuine reasons eg: it is needed for health reasons (for example, to monitor insulin levels) or to help a student with a disability or learning support need (for example, to assist with impaired communication). These arrangements need to be made before the cell phone is used at school. Parents / Caregivers will need to email the principal (principal@tapawera.school.nz) stating the reason the phone needs to be used during the day. An exemption will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

If pupils need to contact home in an emergency, they should do so via the school office. Parents and caregivers can also call the office if they need to contact their child during the school day.



Breaches of the cellphone rules include (but not limited to):

- using the device when not permitted
- any sort of bullying, including online bullying
- taking photos or videos of other people without their permission
- forwarding inappropriate messages or content.

Cellphones 'away for the day' expectations

In circumstances where usage has breached the school cellphone rules (see above) the result will be confiscation for the rest of the school day. The device will then be retrieved by the student after school from the office. The inappropriate use recorded in Edge and Whānau will be contacted.

Continuous inappropriate usage

If a student decides to inappropriately use a cell phone for a second time in a week the cell phone will be confiscated. It can only be retrieved by a parent or caregiver. This will be recorded on the Edge. If after the two breaches, inappropriate use continues this will then be referred to the appropriate Deputy Principal or Principal.

Learning activities

If cell phones are used for a learning activity in Years 11-13, this will be at the teacher's discretion and a staff member will supervise the phone's use. Guidelines on appropriate usage still apply.

Health and Emergencies

Students with additional learning needs who use cell phones in class to increase or improve their ability to participate and learn will be granted an exemption. In matters related to a student's immediate health and safety concerns, a parent or caregiver can apply at any time to the principal for a period of exemption (e.g. medical conditions or protection issues).

Education outside the classroom (EOTC)

Students may take certain digital devices on EOTC activities but should check whether they are allowed before the activity commences. A contract will be signed before the trip. Usage will be at the discretion of teachers and other adult supervisors.

Please note with all exemptions and exceptions appropriate usage guidelines and other relevant school rules still apply.
